

Self—Discovery: The process of acquiring insight into one's character.

CHARACTERS

Robinson Crusoe

Crusoe is the narrator and protagonist of this biographical and fictional story. While his father has hopes of him becoming a lawyer, Crusoe dreams of adventure and glory outside of England. Despising his father's sound advice, Crusoe chooses a path of rebellion and disobedience; landing him in the position of being shipwrecked and utterly alone on an island in the Caribbean. During this forced isolation, Crusoe must confront his beliefs about God, contentment, good and evil, and learn true repentance.

Friday

Friday is a young Caribbean native who is rescued by Crusoe on his shipwreck island, moments before a warring cannibal tribe is about to consume him. Friday, full of awe and gratitude, dedicates his life to Crusoe and becomes his companion and servant. Crusoe helps Friday to understand that cannibalism is wicked, and teaches him the ways of Christianity. Friday gladly accepts Jesus as his personal saviour and longs to return to his tribe to share the good news with his lost family and friends.

STORYLINE

Robinson Crusoe yearns for the sea and adventure, finding his middle-class life and prospects in York, England, dull and unappealing. Giving in to the temptation to travel abroad to seek riches and glory, Robinson despises all wise counsel, as well as his conscience, to fulfil his desires. With a sense of foreboding and dread looming over him, Crusoe pushes those feelings aside and embarks on his journey. For a short time, he is successful, but his success is short-lived, and he finds himself shipwrecked, stranded, and entirely alone on an unknown island.

This is an adventure tale that explores the providence of God, self-discovery through forced isolation, contentment in all circumstances, and the value of true repentance.

A Note to the Reader

Robinson Crusoe was first published in 1719, a time when culture and language were very different from today. Within the pages of this book, you will come across outdated and offensive terminology for people groups, as well as abhorrent practices of selling and buying people for slavery. It's important to consider this while reading, and to always remember that every human being has been made in God's image, and is, therefore, inherently valuable; all men and women, no matter their gender, heritage, skin colour, or abilities, are all equal in God's sight.
